The Classics Major - Greek Emphasis requires a minimum of 30 credits listed under GREEK and CL CV plus a WLC 2010 or 2020 and a WLC Practicum Signature Experience for a total of **36 credits**. At least 15 credits have to be taken at the University of Utah. All courses must be passed with a grade of C or better. CR/NC may NOT be elected for these courses.

Students are encouraged to take WLC 2010 or 2020 before any other upper-division courses for the major and the WLC Practicum Signature Experience (except Learning Abroad) after all or most of the other courses have been finished.
